
### WHERE YOU CAN SERVE



# EDUCATION BENEFITS-RESIDENTS/FELLOWS

RESIDENTS OPTING TO SERVE FULL-TIME IN THE NAVY CAN GET SUPPLEMENTAL INCOME IN RESIDENCY THROUGH THE NAVY FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (FAP), WHICH MAY OFFER YOU \$295,000 OR MORE DURING YOUR MEDICAL RESIDENCY.

### FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (FAP)

#### FAP provides:

Financial assistance during a medical/dental residency or fellowship, including\*:

- A \$45,000 annual grant on top of any residency program-based salary
- A monthly stipend of \$2400+ to cover living expenses for up to four years

#### Residents and fellows opting to serve part-time as a Reserve service member can join

#### Training in Medical Specialty (TMS)

 A monthly stipend of \$2400+ while completing a medical residency program, plus up to \$250,000 in medical school loan repayment assistance\*

### PRACTICING PROFESSIONALS

### Practicing physicians opting to serve full-time in the Navy can get help repaying educational loans.

If you're currently a practicing physician, you may receive:

- Up to \$400,000 sign-on bonus\*
- \* Bonus amounts vary by specialty and are adjusted annually. Contact Medical Officer Recruiter for current details.

## Practicing physicians opting to serve part-time as Reservists can get a choice of any one of these three generous financial offers:

- Up to \$225,000 sign-on bonus\*
- Up to \$250,000 in medical school loan repayment assistance

# FAQ

### WHAT IS THE MILITARY MATCH?

The Military Match is a highly competitive "match" process where medical students compete for a limited number of civilian and military residencies. Like all residency matching, space in each program is limited and selected based on the most competitive applications received.

### WHEN DOES THE MILITARY MATCH HAPPEN?

The Military Match happens in December as opposed to the spring for civilians. This allows HPSP students to apply for selection into the Navy Active Duty Delay for Specialist (NADDS) program, which authorizes them to complete a civilian residency.

### WHAT HAPPENS IF I'M NOT SELECTED?

In the Navy, you are welcome to reapply for any specialty. Applicants who excel as a General Medical Officer (GMO) or staff physician are often successful on reapplication. Additionally, you'll have the opportunity to go on a GMO tour even if you don't match.

# WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE MILITARY AND CIVILIAN RESIDENCIES?

The Military Match provides medical students with the unique opportunity to apply for a civilian residency as well as a military residency. This also means you'll have two tries at matching as opposed to only one in other military branches.

### WHAT IS A GENERAL MEDICAL OFFICER OR GMO?

General Medical Officers (GMO) are licensed medical officers who typically serve as general practitioners in the Flight, Undersea/Dive, Marine Corps or Surface Warfare communities. They are responsible for all things medical including urgent care, health maintenance and first-line trauma management. As a GMO, you will lead your medical department with a team of highly trained Hospital Corpsmen by your side.

# TIMELINE (HPSP)

#### OFFICER DEVELOPMENT SCHOOL (ODS)

This is a five-week Navy officer orientation at Newport, Rhode Island, which typically is completed during the first or second summer break of medical school.

#### MED SCHOOL YEAR 4, APPLY FOR MILITARY MATCH

During the early part (i.e. July - October) of the senior year in medical school, medical students apply for a Navy internship. If the Navy has more medical school graduates than available positions in Navy Internships, the Navy allows a certain number of graduates to remain in the civilian sector and get their training in what is called a "deferred" status—Navy Active Duty Delay for Specialists (NADDS) Program
