COMLEX-USA Level 1 and USMLE Step 1... A Roadmap to Success

An Overview of Milestones and Criteria: COMBANK, Qualifying Exams (QEs) and COMLEX

COCA Accreditation Requirements – COMLEX USA Level 1 and Level 2-CE

Must pass the NBOME COMLEX-USA Level 1 & Level 2-CE exams in sequence to advance in the curriculum & graduate

- <u>COMLEX-USA Level 1</u>
 - MUST sit for COMLEX-USA Level 1 prior to June 16, 2025, between 2nd & 3rd academic year
 - Cannot start clinical rotations until COMLEX taken
 - MUST register & schedule a Level 1 test date as soon as possible
 - NBOME COMLEX Level 1 website: https://www.nbome.org/assessments/comlex-usa/level-1/

COMLEX-USA Level 2-CE

- Must complete or schedule a date that will provide a score release prior to June of graduation year
- If not, CUSOM cannot certify a student for graduation in time to start their residency training
- NBOME COMLEX Level 2-CE website: <u>https://www.nbome.org/assessments/comlex-usa/level-2-ce/</u>

COMLEX must be the priority during board prep

- In order to graduate with the DO degree, you must pass COMLEX Level 1 and Level 2-CE
- In order to obtain an unrestricted license to practice medicine, you must additionally pass COMLEX Level 3 during residency
- As such, **COMLEX**, <u>not</u> the USMLE, must be the **primary focus** of board preparation

COMLEX Level 1 and USMLE Step 1 are very different exams

Most students do not need to take USMLE (and in many cases, should NOT take it)

The determination as to whether taking USMLE is appropriate for you should only be made after very careful consideration

- Of your specific situation (specialty of choice, geographic targets, competitiveness of the specialty, <u>your</u> competitiveness for the specialty, and many other factors)
- Of your potential for success on the USMLE (performance in years 1 & 2, on review questions, practice exams, etc.)
- Including a detailed **discussion** with the **corresponding Clinical Chair** and CUSOM Clinical Affairs and GME faculty
- Performance on the CBSSA USMLE Practice Exam strongly correlates with potential to pass USMLE

CUSOM Student Specialty Selection

- 1. 61% of C/O 2024 entered a primary care residency training program
 - FM, IM, IM/Peds, Peds, OB/Gyn
- 2. 82% of C/O 2024 entered residency in the above specialties w/ the addition of **Psych, EM**, & Gen Surg

Specialties Supporting the Acceptance of COMLEX as equivalent to USMLE

- 1. Any similarities to the specialties most frequently chosen by CUSOM students?
- 2. A significant # of residency programs from other specialties not listed also accept COMLEX

The decision to take USMLE should only be made after <u>very careful consideration</u> of your specific situation and only in consultation with the corresponding Clinical Chair, CUSOM Clinical Affairs and GME

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Qualifying Exams (QEs)

- 1. Utilized to help assess student readiness to take COMLEX; protects students from taking COMLEX if \uparrow risk of failing
- 2. Passing one or more of the QEs is predictive of a higher likelihood of passing COMLEX (but not a guarantee)
- 3. Failing to achieve a passing score on the QEs is predictive of ↑ risk of failing COMLEX; indicates additional preparation needed
- 4. CUSOM covers cost of all QEs

Two Pathways to Qualify for COMLEX Level 1

- 1. <u>Pathway 1</u>: Pass Qualifying Exam 1 (QE #1) or Qualifying Exam 2 (QE #2)
- 2. <u>Pathway 2</u>: Enter a Modified Course of Study (MCOS) to complete a Board Preparation Program 3 options
 - Option 1: Complete the Kaplan Program and pass Qualifying Exam 3 (QE #3)
 - <u>Option 2</u>: Successfully complete the Boards Boot Camp (BBC) Program & all associated requirements
 - Option 3: Successfully complete the **PASS Program** & all associated requirements



Qualifying for COMLEX Level 1: Pathway 1 – Passing QE #1 or QE #2

Achieving a Qualifying Score on QE #1 or QE #2

- 1. Earn passing grade for CABS II course
- 2. Eligible to take COMLEX Level 1 (testing cycle opens May 7th)
- 3. Continue independent study; welcome to participate in any/all of the Kaplan Review sessions & remaining QE exam(s)
- 4. Must take COMLEX Level 1 prior to June 16, 2025
- 5. Start SIM Month (first 3rd-year clinical rotation) on June 16, 2025
- Considered a provisional 3rd-year student until receive a passing score on COMLEX Level 1



MCOS to Qualify for COMLEX Level 1: Pathway 2 - Option 1: Kaplan

Students who do not achieve a passing score on QE #1 or QE #2 may be placed in a Modified Course of Study (**MCOS**) to complete a Boards Preparation Program – 3 options

Pathway 2 - Option 1: Kaplan Review Program

- 1. Virtual/online, live, synchronous program (3 days/week, 7 hours/day)
- 2. High-yield content review

Must Complete Kaplan Review & Pass QE #3

- 1. Earn passing grade for CABS II course
- 2. Eligible to take COMLEX Level 1 (but not until passes QE #3-after May 28th)
- 3. Continue independent study until exam
- 4. Must take COMLEX Level 1 prior to June 16, 2025
- 5. Start SIM Month (first 3rd-year clinical rotation) on June 16, 2025
- Considered a provisional 3rd-year student until receive a passing score on COMLEX Level 1



MCOS to Qualify for COMLEX Level 1: Pathway 2 – Option 2: Boards Boot Camp (BBC)

Students who do not achieve a passing score on QE #1 or QE #2 may be placed in a Modified Course of Study (**MCOS**) to complete a Boards Preparation Program – 3 options

Option 2: Boards Boot Camp Ultra Program

- 1. Asynchronous online, comprehensive review program; cannot exceed 90 days
- 2. CUSOM pays for BBC (to get student a discount), then bills student's account
- 3. Very structured; must follow all BBC timelines & requirements
- Successful completion requires passing Post-Course Diagnostic Exam PCDE (or other BBC-designated exam) and be approved BBC

Successful Completion of BBC

- 1. Earn passing grade for CABS II course
- 2. Must take COMLEX within 14 days of program completion
- 3. Start clinical rotations after taking COMLEX
- Considered a provisional 3rd-year student until receive a passing score on COMLEX Level 1



MCOS to Qualify for COMLEX Level 1: Pathway 2 - Option 3: PASS Program

Students who do not achieve a passing score on QE #1 or QE #2 may be placed in a Modified Course of Study (**MCOS**) to complete a Boards Preparation Program – 3 options

Option 3: PASS Program

- 1. Live in-person or online review program, approx. 5 weeks in duration
- 2. Cannot exceed 90 days
- 3. Must follow all PASS program requirements
- 4. PASS must indicate successful program completion (may include passing one or more qualifying exams determined by PASS) & verify readiness for COMLEX

Successful Completion of PASS

- 1. Earn passing grade for CABS II course
- 2. Must take COMLEX within 14 days of program completion
- 3. Start clinical rotations after taking COMLEX
- Considered a provisional 3rd-year student until receive a passing score on COMLEX Level 1



Summary of Pathways for Qualifying for COMLEX Level 1



The window for taking COMLEX is May 7 – June 15, 2025

- 1. Simulation Medicine (first clinical rotation of year 3) begins on June 16, 2025
- 2. Must take COMLEX prior to beginning clinical rotations
- 3. Students must register with the NBOME & schedule a COMLEX Level 1 exam date within the May 7 June 15, 2025, window
 - NBOME advises candidates attempt to schedule an exam at least 120 days in advance of the desired test date

Testing Accommodation Requests for COMLEX

- 1. Students who wish to request testing accommodations from the NBOME should do so **NOW**
- 2. Substantial documentation may be required; NBOME may take up to 75 days (or longer) to review & render decision
- 3. <u>Important</u>: previous awarding of accommodations, including by CUSOM, does not mean accommodations will be granted by the NBOME

Test Accommodations – NBOME

COMBANK Requirements

2,000 questions minimum to be completed prior to start of CABS II on April 28, 2025

- Part of the requirements for the CABS II Course
- 1. 1,300 due before the practice exam on January 3, 2025
 - 1000+ already completed in the CABS I course
 - 300 on or before January 3, 2025
 - Includes any other COMBANK questions already completed in Blocks 5 & 6 beyond the 1,000 required for CABS I
- 2. Requirements between January 4, 2025 & April 28, 2025
 - **350 more before QE #1** on March 8, 2025 (before Spring Break)
 - 350 more before QE #2 on April 22, 2025 (after the Reproductive System)
 - These 700 additional questions brings the total 2,000 COMBANK COMLEX-USA Level 1 questions.

Why does CUSOM require the completion of so many questions?

CUSOM's data analysis shows a <u>direct correlation</u> between total number of questions a student completes and a higher score/pass rate on their NBOME licensing exams.

- For example, the CUSOM DO Classes of 2017-2023 (2024 first class without scores) students scoring > 700 (mean = 500; passing = 400) on COMLEX-USA Level 1 averaged between 5,000 & 20,000 questions
- While COMLEX Level 1 is Pass/Fail, a numerical score is still provided on COMLEX Level 2-CE
- To meet these question totals, students need to supplement COMBANK questions with questions from other banks:
 - **COMQUEST,** Kaplan, COMTESTMed, BoardVitals, etc.
 - U-World (**only** if taking USMLE or have completed other test banks)

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Developing a Study Schedule:

How to Integrate Board Prep into Blocks 7-8

Tips:

- 1. Do well in your courses for Blocks 7-8
 - Review First Aid content that coincides with coursework
 - Practice board-style questions that coincide with coursework
- 2. Reflect on your weakest area(s)...and do content review PLUS questions
 - Prioritize weakest \rightarrow strongest
 - Some things may require more repetition
- 3. Block off "breaks" from studying
- 4. Check in with yourself regularly!
 - How are you doing in your courses? How is your board prep going?
 - How are YOU doing? Does anything need to be adjusted???

Developing a Study Schedule: Full-Time Board Prep (after Block 8)

Tips:

- 1. Reflect on QE #1 and #2:
 - What progress have you made?
 - Where should you put more focus?
- 2. Develop a study schedule working backwards from your target exam date

As you get closer to the exam date, shift to doing more questions and timed, practice exams.

Strategies for COMLEX Level 1 Preparation

- 1. Familiarize Yourself with the Exam (e.g., structure, content, etc.)
- 2. Develop a Study Schedule
- 3. Stick to a Few Resources (that work for <u>YOU</u>!)
- 4. Integrate Content Review <u>AND</u> Practice Questions
- 5. Take Practice Exams

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Some Resources for Content Review

- First Aid: good "overview" of the high-yield content across all major topics (good resource to annotate)
- Savarese's OMT Review: "green book"; overview of OMT techniques, diagnosis, and clinical applications
- Kaplan Online Course & Review Books: comprehensive online course & books covering all subject areas (plus question bank)
- Boards & Beyond: videos on foundational topics for understanding core concepts (biochem, pharm, path, and phys)
- Sketchy: videos with illustrated stories (micro, pharm, etc.); good for helping with recall
- **Picmonics:** videos & mnemonics; good for helping with recall
- Pathoma: book & videos for pathology & the integration of pathology in the systems-based content (e.g., cardio, GI, etc.)
- Anki: Use as a spaced repetition tool for high-yield facts/details

And many others!!! Remember, worry about YOU!

CUSOM Student Survey Question:

What advice would you give other students preparing to take COMLEX-USA Level 1/USMLE Step 1 regarding planning their study time?

What would you do differently if you could change how you approached preparation for the test?

Common themes:

- Make a study plan, and start studying early, integrating board study into coursework.
- Complete as many practice questions as possible.
- Try to do practice questions on a DAILY basis to help reinforce the material.
- Read and use the USMLE First Aid book as a study source.
- Focus on your weaknesses.
- Take more practice exams.

CUSOM Student Survey Question:

What advice can you give to members of future CUSOM students to help them be successful on Level 1 / Step 1?

- "No one is really going to tell you when you should start building time into your schedule for board studying. SLOWLY
 introduce it, even if it is just 1-5 questions a day. Definitely don't immediately start cramming for boards on topics
 you haven't even covered yet. Also don't start ignoring what is going on in class in order to board study."
- "Don't focus on what everyone else is doing what may work for you may not work for someone else and vice versa. Trust what you are doing."
- "Don't burn yourself out by studying too early! Review everything by studying in systems. Do questions according to system then as you move on do them all together. Take notes in First Aid and reference First Aid. ANKI helps, especially for micro and pharm."
- "Listen to CUSOM!! They know what they're doing. Do the TrueLearn questions, use a resource to help you form
 a study schedule, and take practice tests. Use other question banks too. If you need help with what you should
 be doing or how to structure your dedicated study time, reach out and ask because they are super helpful."
- "Focus on weak areas and do a lot of questions on those topics. I would review a topic, then focus on doing
 questions based on my review, and then at the end of the day if I had time, do questions on things I thought I needed to
 work on and get better at. That way I was still reviewing material that was listed on my study schedule but staying fresh
 on things I had already looked at."

Practices of Students Successful in Passing COMLEX

- 1. Address test-taking anxiety (reach out to CUSOM Behavioral Health NOW if needed)
- 2. Follow sound advice & what works for YOU
- 3. Thoughtfully complete lots of questions (DO THOUSANDS OF QUESTIONS!)
- 4. Complete timed practice exams, especially an 8-hour day
 - Do some double COMSAEs (maybe do them in this building not your home: out of your "comfort zone")
 - Kaplan has 2 full-length non-proctored practice exams for Step 1
- 5. Limit your study materials
 - Using too many study guides and other resources is not efficient & increases anxiety
- 6. Establish a study plan well in advance
 - Adhere to your plan, especially the "routine" and planned periods of board prep.
 - Allow some flexibility to adjust the focus of content review and practice questions based on YOUR data—where are those weak areas? What areas have you mastered?
 - Anticipate some "burn" days by building in margin from your anticipated test date.

Some final thoughts...

- GPA, COMBANK Q's & Exam, COMSAE... do correlate with COMLEX...BUT (a big but ©):
 - A Low GPA does <u>not</u> mean a student will FAIL COMLEX; just increases the importance of a good prep plan
 - A High GPA does <u>not</u> mean a student PASS COMLEX; don't get complacent must continue to prepare
- The information in this presentation is provided to help you make informed (<u>educated</u>) decisions (not to scare you ⁽ⁱ⁾)
 - Self-reflect, be honest with yourself, and reach out for help if needed
- While CUSOM offers suggestions, students ultimately decide how to prepare
- Remember what got you into medical school and that almost everyone will succeed (even if for a few it means taking COMLEX a second time)
